





Thanks so much to everyone who came to visit the Museum's Historic House on Friday, November 30 for Deco the Halls, our annual holiday evening open house. For the first time we used a clicker to record how many visitors we had and between 7-9pm, we had 92 people tour the Museum house! Last chance to see the decorations is Sunday, December 23, 1-5pm. We will be closed on Sunday, December 30 and open by appointment only through January 27. We will re-open on Sunday, February 3, 2019.

We are so grateful to all of you who support the Museum throughout the year whether it's by attending a lecture, volunteering, being a member, supporting our expansion project, following us on social media, or simply telling a friend or neighbor to come see us! Because the Museum is a partnership between the City of Greenbelt and the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum, a nonprofit, we could not do what we do without your help. In FY 2018, with the help of our volunteers, we gave tours of the historic house to 493 people on Sundays. We

gave walking tours of the community to 730 people, and we reached an additional 1100 people through our lectures, programs, and events. Many of the people we reach are not familiar with Greenbelt's history or the mission of its founders. Now more than ever, we feel that Greenbelt's story is a relevant one. The ideals under which Greenbelt was founded: cooperation, egalitarianism, community, sustainability, efficient land use, thoughtful architecture,

and design — all deserve a place in both our present and our future. The blueprint is here and we are proud to share the successes of this experiment. With your help we can do even more! Food History Lecture

Immigration is a topic much in the news lately and Greenbelt's population has become increasingly diverse over the course of its 80 years. With these thoughts in mind, we invited budding food historian Elliot Merker to join us for a talk about food history and the ongoing influence that immigration has had on food in this country. Merker's talk was wide-ranging and included the concept of an immigrant food cycle. Frequently, once an immigrant community has been established, grocery stores open to serve that community, then restaurants follow. Eventually, fusion with

more traditional American cuisine takes place, and the final phase is when the food is assimilated into the mainstream. We recently came across this vintage magazine advertisement for Heinz Cooked Spaghetti. It illustrates how even though the traditionally Italian dish had begun to move into the mainstream by 1939 when the ad was produced, much of the copy is encouraging housewives to give it a try for dinner.


Podcast Featuring Museum Available Now

Federal Theatre Exhibit Opens

Sunday, November 18, Chris Cherry of Greenbelt's Recreation Department gave an illustrated lecture about the Federal Theatre Project and its Greenbelt connections to mark the opening of a permanent exhibit of Federal Theatre Project posters. The exhibit, installed in the first floor elevator alcove of the Community Center, was curated by Cherry. It features striking WPA posters advertising works sponsored by the significant New Deal program. During his talk, Cherry discussed the history of

the Federal Theatre Project and its untimely demise at the hands of reactionary members of Congress who objected to its progressive ideals including integration and equal pay for men and women of color. In their first season in 1938, the Greenbelt Players staged a Federal Theatre project play by Betty Smith, called *What Are You Going to Be*. Smith would go on to write *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn*. The presentation also featured WPA songs sung by Aidan Larkin.


If You Ask Me: Essential Advice from Eleanor Roosevelt
